phonetics deals with the production of speech sounds by humans often without prior knowledge of the language being spoken phonology is about patterns of sounds especially different patterns of sounds in different languages or within each language different patterns of sounds in different positions in words etc phonology is the branch of linguistics that studies how languages systematically organize their phones or for sign languages their constituent parts of signs the term can also refer specifically to the sound or sign system of a particular language variety phonetics is concerned with universal properties of speech studied by scientific methods it deals with physical or concrete reality while phonology is concerned with the linguistic organization of this reality some of the key topics are the anatomy physiology and acoustics of the human vocal tract the nomenclature for the vocal articulations and sounds used in speech as represented by the international phonetic alphabet hypotheses about the nature of phonological features and their organization into segments syllables and words the way that learn how phonetics and phonology differ in their focus methods and goals phonetics studies the physical properties of speech sounds while phonology studies the abstract and systematic organization of sounds in language what is phonetics phonetics examines how we produce and perceive sounds there are lots of key terms in phonetics and different linguists might use them a bit differently theories of phonology aim to adequately describe and explain the structure of the phonological components of languages by the analysis of their sound patterns my focus here is on two main goals of phonological description and analysis our research integrates phonetic and phonological theory with other aspects of language structure syntax morphology and language use sociolinguistics psycholinguistics pragmatics and pursues its implications for closely related fields metrics historical linguistics language change

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
