from a complex of interpersonal relations can never occur in which the person has his being and lives according to sullivan the knowledge of human personality according to sullivan can only be gained through rigorous scientific study of interpersonal relations the emphasis of his interpersonal theory is on the importance of the developmental stages infancy childhood the juvenile era preadolescence early adolescence late adolescence and adulthood a person's ability to establish intimacy with others may determine healthy human development yet unfortunately anxiety can cause interference with the satisfaction of interpersonal relations during any of the mentioned developmental stages it may be for preadolescence to represent the most crucial of developmental stages where children first become capable of the capacity for intimacy yet have not attained an age where lustful interests complicate their intimate relationships the belief of sullivan is the achievement of healthy development in people when they are capable of experiencing both lust and intimacy toward the same other person in the decade before he became the highly controversial director of psychedelic drug research at harvard timothy leary was one of the leading clinical psychologists practicing in the u s heading the prestigious kaiser foundation psychological research center in oakland interpersonal diagnosis of personality 1957 his first full length book summarizes the innovative experimental studies in interpersonal behavior performed by the author and his associates at the kaiser foundation and in private practice between 1950 and 1957 interpersonal sensitivity refers to the accuracy and or appropriateness of perceptions judgments and responses we have with respect to one another it is relevant to nearly all aspects of social relations and has long been studied by social personality and clinical psychologists until now however no systematic or comprehensive treatment of this complex concept has been attempted in this volume the major theorists and researchers of interpersonal sensitivity describe their approaches both critically and integratively specific tests and methods are presented and evaluated the authors address issues ranging from the practical to the broadly theoretical and discuss future challenges topics include sensitivity to deception emotion personality and other personal characteristics empathy the status of self reports dyadic interaction procedures lens model approaches correlational and categorical measurement approaches thin slice and variance partitioning methodologies and others this volume offers the single most comprehensive treatment to date of this widely acknowledged but often vaguely operationalized and communicated social competency north american psychoanalysis has long been deeply influenced and substantially changed by clinical and theoretical perspectives first introduced by interpersonal psychoanalysis yet even today despite its origin in the 1930s many otherwise well read psychoanalysts and psychotherapists are not well informed about the field the interpersonal perspective in psychoanalysis 1960s 1990s provides a superb starting point for those who are not as familiar with interpersonal psychoanalysis as they might be for those who already know the literature the book will be useful in placing a selection of classic interpersonal articles and their writers in key historical context during the time span covered in this book interpersonal psychoanalysis was most concerned with revising the understanding of the analytic relationship transference and countertransference and how to work with it most of the works collected here center on this theme the interpersonal perspective introduced the view that the analyst is always and unavoidably a particular real person and that transference and countertransference need to be reconceptualized to take the analyst's individual humanity into account the relationship needs to
